II. Reason for proposed action

Currently the Health Education Program in the Department of Health Education & Recreation offers a MPH in Community Health Education and a PhD in Education: Health Education. We would like to offer a Concurrent MPH/PhD in which students are enrolled in both programs and graduate with both the MPH and the PhD. This concurrent MPH/PhD will NOT replace our current offerings, but will allow us to recruit highly talented students who have earned their Bachelor's degree.

Background: Public health has seen a massive growth over the past 25 years. Recently, the Health Education Program at SIUC initiated an MPH in Community Health Education. The program, now in its third year, is attracting outstanding students. Since 2001 public health has received special attention. Issues associated with emergency preparedness and bioterrorism have increased the awareness and visibility of public health. In addition, the current health status of America continues to be a priority for the public health arena, especially behavioral risk factors associated with major leading causes of death and disability (i.e., heart disease, cancer, diabetes, intentional and unintentional injuries).

The number of universities offering programs in public health has increased substantially during the past five years. For example, here at Southern, the majority of majors in health education are selecting the community health education emphasis. Traditionally offered only through Schools of Public Health, the

MPH is becoming the premier degree for individuals who wish to pursue public health endeavors. It can also serve as a gateway to a PhD.

Offering a concurrent MPH/PhD will do several things:

- 1. Prepare students with a strong public health background. This preparation meets the accrediting body's requirement for instruction related to the core areas of public health as well as a major focus on community health education;
- 2. Prepare students with a strong research background, along with the necessary skills to effectively teach at the university level;
- 3. Provide a concentrated semester in which the students will be placed at an approved academic institution, agency (i.e., CDC) to spend time teaching or conducting research in academic settings or working with a federal agency in organizing a public health event.
- 4. Organize the required health education coursework in a more logical sequence. It is true that a student who has earned an MPH can apply to our doctoral program. However, with this concurrent MPH/PhD the student will be able to more logically sequence courses. In addition, this concurrent program will expand the scope of students' course experiences. Because some courses are required for both degrees, students will be able to take additional courses to meet credit requirements:
- 5. Continue to illustrate to health education programs in the U.S. that Southern is a leader in creativity and in preparing health educators. The doctoral program is highly ranked and has been recognized by leaders in the health education field for decades. There is NO other health education program in the country that currently offers a concurrent MPH/PhD. There are many universities that offer concurrent degrees such as MD/MPH, and PhD/MPH, but the latter usually consists of differing majors; none are in health education. Both the University of Pittsburgh and Case Western University offer a joint PhD (Anthropology)/MPH (in behavioral health). Currently SIUC offers several concurrent degrees including the JD/MSW.

Students enrolled in the program will be required to complete the 43- hour required MPH and the 64-hour PhD in Education: Health Education. Students will complete a dissertation (requirement for the PhD) and a 6 hour practicum (requirement for the MPH).

In the event that the person admitted into the program is unable, or has been deemed by the Health Education faculty as being unable to complete the doctoral work, the student will be awarded the MPH when they complete all requirements of that degree.

It is anticipated that students enrolled in the concurrent PhD/MPH will be able to complete all requirements within 4-5 years.

Application/Admission. Requirements for admission to the doctoral or master's degree programs in health education are:

Completion and submission of Graduate School admission application; a nonrefundable \$45.00 application fee must be submitted with the application for those applying for the Doctoral of Philosophy in Education degree, Master of Science in Education degree or for the Master of Public Health degree. Applicants may pay this fee by credit card if applying electronically. Doctor of Philosophy Degree in Education

The Health Education program participates in the doctoral program with a concentration in health education. Other than general requirements of the Graduate School for all Ph.D. degrees, and of the College of Education and Human Services for all Ph.D. degrees in education, the program requires satisfactory completion of HED

500, 510, 515, 525, 526, 533a, 533b, 536, and 597.2. Programs are individually developed with each student. Successful completion of EPSY 506 and one additional course in quantitative or qualitative methods is required for fulfillment of the research tool for students in the Health Education program. The course of study must include one additional research methods course (if the research tool is quantitative, then the additional methods course must be qualitative and vice versa.) A B average is required in the three courses.

See the description of the Ph,D. degree in education in this chapter for further details.

Master of Public Health Degree

Applicants for the Master of Public Health degree must have a 3.00 undergraduate grade point average (A=4.0)

to be admitted in good standing.

Only graduate level courses taken after a student's admission to the program will be included automatically in the student's degree program. "Nondeclared" hours or hours from other degree programs must be petitioned into the program. Courses eligible for inclusion in a degree program must be graduate level and cannot have been applied toward another degree.

The Health Education program offers a graduate program leading to either a Doctoral of Philosophy in Education with an emphasis in health education, the Master of Science in Education in Health Education or the Master of Public Health in Community Health Education. Persons interested in pursuing either degree should initially consult the director of graduate studies regarding appropriate courses and assignment to an adviser.

Application/Admission. Requirements for admission to the doctoral or master's degree programs in health education are:

1. Completion and submission of Graduate School admission application; a nonrefundable \$45.00 application fee must be submitted with the application for those applying for the Doctoral of Philosophy in Education degree, Master of Science in Education degree or for the Master of Public Health degree. Applicants may pay this fee by credit card if applying electronically. Applicants submitting a paper application must pay by personal check, cashier's check, or money order made out to SIU, and payable to a U.S. Bank.

 Completion and submission of the Health Education admission application that includes a 300-500 word statement regarding experience and professional goals (www.hedir.org/siu).

Submission of three recommendation forms (available online at www.hedir.org/siu).
 Submission of all official transcripts for previous undergraduate and graduate work.

All specified application materials must be submitted directly to the Department of Health Education and Recreation, Southern Illinois University Carbondale, Carbondale, Illinois 62901-4632. Further information may be obtained by calling 618-453-2777.

Application deadline for summer and fall admission is the third Friday in January; application deadline for spring admission is September 1. Exceptions to these dates may be considered. Contact the graduate director for more information.

Doctor of Philosophy Degree in Education

The Health Education program participates in the doctoral program with a concentration in health education. Other than general requirements of the Graduate School for all Ph.D. degrees, and of the College of Education and Human Services for all Ph.D. degrees in education, the program requires satisfactory completion of HED

500, 510, 515, 525, 526, 533a, 533b, 536, and 597-2. Programs are individually developed with each student. Successful completion of EPSY 506 and one additional course in quantitative or qualitative methods is required for fulfillment of the research tool for students in the Health Education program. The course of study must include one additional research methods course (if the research tool is quantitative, then the additional methods course must be qualitative and vice versa.) A B average is required in the three courses.

See the description of the Ph.D. degree in education in this chapter for further details.

Master of Public Health Degree

Applicants for the Master of Public Health degree must have a 3.00 undergraduate grade point average (A=4.0)

to be admitted in good standing.

Only graduate level courses taken after a student's admission to the program will be included automatically in the student's degree program. "Nondeclared" hours or hours from other degree programs must be petitioned into the program. Courses eligible for inclusion in a degree program must be graduate level and cannot have been applied toward another degree.

Master of Public Health Degree Requirements

Each student will work with an advisor to select an additional 3 hours from courses within Health Education or related courses.

Master of Science in Education Degree

Applicants for the master's degree must have a 3.00 undergraduate grade point average (A = 4.0) to be admitted in good standing. Only graduate level courses taken after a student's admission will be included automatically in the student's degree program. "Nondeclared" hours or hours from other degree programs must be petitioned into the program. Courses eligible for inclusion in a degree program must be graduate level and cannot have been applied toward another degree.

For potential health education graduate students who are taking courses as nondeclared students, the following will apply: 1) no more than six hours of graduate credit can be applied toward the master's degree in health education: 2) Health Education 533a cannot be taken until a student is formally admitted to the graduate progam in health education.
